



Gardella graduated in engineering in 1928 and was a rigorous interpreter of Rationalism in the 1930s, with buildings such as the Antitubercular Dispensary of Alessandria (1936). After WWII his buildings were embellished with elements from the rural tradition, such as the Borsalino Houses once again in Alessandria, (1952). His House at the Zattere in Venice (1957) is one of the most widely acclaimed examples of introducing modern architecture into a monumental historical setting. He also designed products for Azucena, Gavina, and Kartell. He won the President of the Republic's Gold Medal at the Venice Biennial (1996). He was also an honorary member of RIBA (Royal Institute of British Architects) and the Academy of San Luca
